
#### Join Our Giving Tuesday Celebration!


### A Win for Rooftop Solar in Wisconsin

On Friday, the Public Service Commission (PSC) of Wisconsin rejected Madison Gas & Electric's proposal to overhaul net metering - a huge win for the future of rooftop solar in Wisconsin! Net metering helps solar owners recoup the high upfront cost of installing rooftop solar and makes rooftop solar possible for low and middle-income homeowners.

In addition to preserving net metering, the PSC also took action to reduce MGE's authorized return on equity, which will reduce the overall rate increase for customers. While we wish the PSC had gone even further, we are pleased that the commission took some action to address inequitable energy burdens by limiting shareholder profits.

Both cities are taking responses at least through the middle of November, and are provided in multiple languages. The Madison survey is for its "Sustainability Update Plan" (its first plan was published in 2011), while the Fitchburg survey is for its first plan. Both cities seek input from their residents while also welcoming input from residents of neighboring communities. The two surveys are quite different in format. The Fitchburg survey can be completed in 7.5 minutes. The Madison survey (which includes links to the current draft plan) can be completed in as little as 10 minutes. **Your opinion matters** - please complete these surveys.

#### **Learn About the Farm Bill**


Every five years, the federal government reviews and renews the Farm Bill, a sizeable omnibus piece of legislation that controls the allocation of government funds within the agricultural sector. The Farm Bill includes food benefits, commodity crops, energy, forestry, and conservation funding. The current Farm Bill expired on September 30th, and climate could be a vital part of the new bill.

The United States can shift funding away from environmentally harmful practices through bills such as the Agricultural Resilience Act of 2023, Converting Our Waste Sustainably (COWS) Act, and the Farmer's First Act. These transitions could allow the focus to shift towards allocating funds towards initiatives that turn the needle for a more sustainable future, such as

regenerative agricultural practices, funding nutritious horticulture crops over industrial commodities, low-carbon renewable energy production, and support for sustainable forestry.

By advocating for the redistribution of funds, we can prioritize the environment through conservation and regenerative practices. Keep an eye out in the coming months for more updates from 350 Wisconsin about how to advocate for a climate-forward Farm Bill!




#### Congratulations to Middleton, Awarded LEED Gold by USGBC

The City of Middleton is among the first 160 cities and communities globally to be certified by the <u>LEED for Cities & Communities</u> rating system. And it is the first Wisconsin municipality to achieve Gold Level status within the LEED point system.

LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design), established by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), is the world's most widely-used green building rating system. Their LEED for Cities & Communities system expands on its building rating system, and is designed to help cities create, operationalize and measure strategies that improve building energy, water, waste, transportation and other systems in pursuit of a sustainable future for their residents. It helps cities demonstrate their commitment to climate resilience, and human health, equity, safety, and economic prosperity.

Middleton achieved LEED certification by implementing practical and measurable strategies for achieving high performance in social, economic, and environmental sustainability. Specifically, it demonstrated excellence in green space allocation for residents, community-wide renewable energy innovation, and multi-jurisdictional collaboration with the County and other cities on climate mitigation and resiliency projects. Their certification data also highlighted areas where Middleton could improve, including reducing water consumption, improving access to civic resources, and reducing disparities in education, income, and home ownership.



#### Dane County's Sustainability Campus Planning Underway

Dane County's Sustainability Campus planning is fully underway, as the timeline indicates. Among these plans is an organics recycling facility scheduled to accept food waste by Spring 2026. Indeed, Dane County recently released a request for proposals for partners who would permit and/or operate this facility. The Community Climate Solutions Team intends to provide information in future 350 Wisconsin newsletters about upcoming opportunities for community input on the Sustainability Campus planning process.



#### New Solar Projects Recently Approved in WI

Positive comments from 350 WI members and other public supporters helped win approval of two new solar developments, the 300 megawatt (MW) Elk Creek Solar project in Dunn County and 200 MW Langdon Mills project in Columbia County.

Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSCW) must approve applications for solar projects greater than 100 MW before they can move forward to construction. As part of the approval process, the public is invited to submit input.

Since 2019, the PSCW has issued approvals for 17 solar power projects across Wisconsin, totaling

3,249 MW. With these new developments, solar energy will make up 10% of Wisconsin's electricity production, up from a pitiful 1.7%.

Additional renewable energy projects are under review, including Vista Sands Solar in Portage County, and Uplands Wind in Lafayette and Iowa Counties. Keep an eye out for emails requesting you to submit comments in support of these important projects. Your effort makes a difference.

## Report-Back from "The Street Project" Screening with Madison Bikes

Members of 350 Wisconsin's Community Climate Solutions Team joined Madison Bikes at their screening of *The Street Project* at the Marquee Theater at Union South. The screening was followed by an engaging panel Q&A, consisting of:

350 Wisconsin's screening attendees highly recommend watching *The Street Project* to learn directly from community organizers about the causes and impacts of traffic violence, and about the movement for bike and pedestriansafe cities. One takeaway from the panel is if you notice any places in your community that are dangerous to bicyclists and/or pedestrians, tell your alder/council member, file a complaint with the city/town/village, and/or see if there are bike/walk audit resources available to you. And if that doesn't work - organize!
